About the Redehall Site

Aurora Redehall School is a small, independent primary school in Surrey, designed specifically for Autistic children with accompanying social and communication difficulties.

Our curriculum

At Aurora Redehall School we strive to fit the curriculum around the child. We offer each pupil a tailored programme of learning based on their baseline assessment, previous academic outcomes and long-term learning targets.

We take a 'multi-agency' approach to curriculum design, with pupils encouraged to make choices about their own programmes, alongside input from their families and outside professionals. Our curriculum design incorporates three elements:

- **Core** – an academic programme based on an appropriate framework, such as the National Curriculum. Tasks and activities are planned on an individual bases to ensure they are meaningful, relevant and achievable.
- **Support** – therapeutic elements to nurture the development of the 'whole person' and to ensure that children are ready to learn. Led by our Speech and Language Therapist (SALT), Occupational Therapist (OT), Psychologist and ELSA (Emotional Literacy Support Assistant), delivery of the support curriculum is integrated into the classroom.
- **Extension** – activities designed to stretch and challenge each pupil, as soon as they are safe and secure in their learning. Extension activities include small-group or 1:1 study, field trips, enterprise and vocational tasters.



Our facilities

Based on a small site near Horley in Surrey, Aurora Redehall School provides all the essential resources suited to our pupils' pastoral and learning needs. The size of the school is conducive to a sense of belonging and enables the relational approach through which staff support pupils to be their very best version of themselves.

Our facilities include an on-site kitchen for learning about food preparation, sensory equipment, a trim trail and a playground. We also take advantage of local amenities such as the leisure centre, swimming pool and horse riding stables.

Learning at Aurora Redehall School isn't just about the classroom – our pupils' experience is extended to the local community and surrounding areas. We are part of a small village with local shops that we can access as part of our life skills curriculum, allowing pupils to practise in a safe, supported environment.

We have a bus stop right outside the school to facilitate travel training.



Your experience with us

Many pupils arriving at Aurora Redehall School have experienced challenges in mainstream environments, often having had extended periods out of schools and gaps in their education. We help each child to overcome their barriers to learning, so they can fully engage with education and enjoy everything that school life has to offer.

We adjust and regularly review the balance between academic study and therapeutic support to best meet individual needs. While our focus is always on increasing independence. If a child is experiencing difficulties we will look to increase therapeutic support.



Our school day

Our pupils arrive at school at 8.50, with registration at 9.00. Throughout the day, the children are taught in small classes of 6-8, with a standard staff ratio of 3:1 (higher if required). When appropriate, pupils will also be taught on a 1:1 basis as well as within the community. We have a team of roadside staff who coordinate the safe transition of students to their parents/carers/transport. We have the option for school dinners or pupils can bring a packed lunch.

Beyond primary



At Aurora Redehall School, we offer our pupils access to a pathway that has the potential to extend throughout their academic career, thanks to a leadership structure shared across Aurora Surrey sites.

With the right support, our pupils go on to achieve academic success through GCSEs, Functional Skills and other national accreditation.

What you need to know

Uniform

- Black trousers or skirt (not denim)
- School polo shirt and sweat-shirt with school logo

Many of our students arrive with communication difficulties or anxieties that have created significant barriers to learning. We take the time to understand each young person's individual needs, so we can better support them in achieving their full potential.

We know that with the right support, they can overcome these challenges and achieve academic success, be it through GCSEs or other qualifications.


Our curriculum

Aurora Caterham Education Centre offers specialist education programmes based on the National Curriculum, each personalised to take account of abilities, interests and needs.

Students have the opportunity to pursue either GCSEs or Functional Skills in the core subjects (Maths, English and Science), as well Food Tech and a range of other subjects that change and flex according to the cohort and their interests.

We also offer a broad programme of PSHE and life skill development, including Employability, and College Transition, with a Social Skills Curriculum embedded across all subjects.

Students are taught in small classes of 8-10, with a standard staff ratio of 3:1 (higher if required) to enable close staff supervision. When appropriate, students are also taught in 1:1 situations as well as within the community. We also provide planned, supervised activity choices during social times to sustain structure throughout the school day.



Integrated therapy

Alongside our academic and life skills programmes, we offer a range of therapeutic interventions designed to help our students overcome barriers to participation in education.

Discrete interventions, including speech and language therapy and occupational therapy, are delivered by our on-site team of highly skilled clinical staff with support from visiting therapy specialists. These interventions sit alongside a classroom experience which integrates therapeutic approaches on a one-to-one, small group and whole class basis.

Sensory integration delivery takes a real-life approach, looking at sensory feedback from taking a walk, going to the cafe or going to the gym, in order to develop transferable strategies that will be sustainable into adult life.



Our facilities

Aurora Caterham Education Centre provides all the essential resources, on a scale that is better suited to our pupils' needs.

Our facilities include an art studio, a fully equipped science laboratory, and an ICT and digital media suite. Students also have the use of an 'Independent Living' kitchen. A range of off-site sports facilities, including a nearby leisure centre, swimming pool and gym are used for recreational activity and PE.

We encourage integration into the local community by using external facilities where possible. Our students are encouraged to explore 'real-life' solutions for self-regulation, for example by walking to the shops or local park when they require a time-out break. These strategies are equally as effective as on-site alternatives, while also being more transferable to adult life.

Your experience with us

We work closely with parents and carers throughout a young person's time with us. You will be closely involved in our Annual Review process, through which we assess individual progress and set targets based on the outcomes in the Education, Health and Care Plan.

We offer families a range of opportunities to participate in training sessions and one-to-one consultations with therapists, as well as providing home visits and advice on strategies to support your child.

Building trust

Our neuro sequential approach to behaviour supports regulation, relating and reasoning. We promote a relational approach that is based on neuroscience and leads to healing of emotional harms. Consistent co-regulation develops resilience in the young people, leading to confident self-regulation.

We respond calmly to anxiety or aggression, offering positive encouragement rather than negative consequences. We encourage reflection and learning from past events in a safe, non-judgemental environment. Our approach is restorative and incorporates strategies from our specialist clinical team.



Case study: Charlie's story

When Charlie first started at Aurora Caterham Education Centre, he struggled to settle in and was initially unable to participate in the classroom at all. Our fantastic staff team thought 'outside the box' and put together an outreach program that started in a local café near Charlie's house led by a 1:1 tutor, with therapy staff visiting to ensure social communication and emotional regulation programmes were in place.

Over the course of the year, Charlie progressed from only being able to be in the playground, to being an engaged and enthusiastic member of his class. He became an exemplary student and regularly received rewards for his acts of kindness towards others.

His natural ability interacting with younger students led to him being offered a work placement as a Key Stage 2 Teaching Assistant at Caterham's sister school, Aurora Redehall School, where he was known as 'Mr Turner'. Charlie is studying a childcare course at his local FE College and combines this with working as a TA Aurora Redehall School.

What you need to know

Uniform

Information on our uniform is sent out to parents in the admissions pack once your place is funded. We are flexible over the uniform to take into consideration sensory needs.

Term dates

Our term dates are sent to parents annually, and are available to download on our website.

Meals

We allow students a choice as to whether they eat with others or on their own (with 1:1 supervision), depending on their needs. We also offer a lunch club where students can prepare their own lunches, integrating independent living skills into social times.
