About our school

Aurora Eccles School is an independent, specialist day school for students aged 11-16 with occasional provision for 16-19, who have experienced difficulties in mainstream settings, either as a result of specific learning difficulties or more complex communication and interaction difficulties (including those associated with autistic spectrum conditions). Some, but not all, of our students have mild to moderate learning difficulties.

We have high expectations for all our students and we encourage them to expect more for themselves. We offer a personalised package of education and support to each student, designed around the needs identified in their Education, Health and Care Plan (EHCP).

Our ambition is to give our students all the skills they need to lead an independent, fulfilling adult life. We do this not only by providing opportunities for them to achieve academically, but also by helping them develop the practical skills necessary to manage their own physical, emotional and social wellbeing and to understand their place in the world.

Our facilities

Students at Aurora Eccles School benefit from facilities including a music room, science laboratories, cookery room, and technology and art studios, and enjoy regular use of our extensive sports and recreation facilities, including an indoor swimming pool, large sports field, activity centre and climbing wall. All students take part in a range of individual and team sports, with both interhouse and external fixtures against other schools throughout the academic year.





Set in 34 acres of beautiful countryside, Aurora Eccles School also has a wealth of exciting outdoor learning spaces for students, including an area of magnificent private woodland, which is used for our Outdoor and Woodland Learning (OWL) programme. Incorporating a range of adventurous activities delivered by qualified Forest School practitioners, the OWL programme offers students the freedom to be the architects of their own learning, all within a natural environment.



Our curriculum

Students at Aurora Eccles School enjoy a broad curriculum that mirrors the experience of their mainstream peers, based around the core subjects of English, mathematics, science and the humanities along with specialist subjects including computing, art and multimedia, and design and technology.

We also offer all of our students opportunities to develop non-academic 'life skills' using a bespoke curriculum that supports them to become more confident handling finances, travelling, socialising, cooking and understanding the wider world around them. We offer a range of subjects and experiences to support students to develop



and demonstrate key skills they will need after leaving Aurora Eccles School. This includes access to PHSE and RSE, study skills across core and non-core subjects, work experience and a clear pathway of careers guidance using the Gatsby Benchmarks. Students also have opportunities to access areas of interest such as horticulture and expressive arts (including drama and music).

The learning experience for students at Aurora Eccles School does not end at the school gate. All our students participate in school visits, trips and community projects to bring the curriculum subjects to life, and they are encouraged to support our staff in organising them. From Year 10 onwards, our students also have the opportunity to participate in the Duke of Edinburgh's Award programme, through which they can experience new challenges and further develop their communication and teamwork skills.

The Aurora Curriculum Framework

Aurora values drive everything we do and give us a framework which informs our curriculum (what we teach our children and young people) and provide us with an overarching intent and aim. This helps us understand the impact our teaching has by providing clear and aspirational targets.

The Aurora Curriculum Framework unites us all whilst providing freedom to develop bespoke, ambitious and tailored curriculum models and learning pathways for our students.

We recognise that:

- All students should have access to a broad and balanced curriculum which engages and challenges them.
- All students need to work at a level which is appropriate to their understanding, relevant to their chronological age and at a rate that suits their individual abilities.
- Teaching is approached with the focus on the individual needs of the student.
- Each student should have a tailored curriculum based upon their baseline assessment, previous academic outcomes, long-term learning targets and life aspirations.

Integrated therapies

As well as academic and skill development opportunities, when indicated in an EHCP, we offer a range of therapeutic interventions designed to help our students overcome barriers to participation in education. Discrete interventions, including speech and language therapy and occupational therapy, are delivered by our on-site team of highly skilled clinical staff with support from visiting therapy specialists. These interventions sit alongside a classroom experience which integrates therapeutic approaches on a one-to-one, small group and whole class basis.



Case study

Case study: Max's journey

When Max* first arrived at Aurora Eccles School he was very unsettled and so was unable to complete much of his work. He spent very little time in the classroom, instead preferring to pick up litter from the school grounds (his 'go-to' activity for when he felt stressed).

To make Max feel more comfortable, we assigned him a small staff team and encouraged him to contribute to a new set of rules for the classroom. This allowed him to begin to integrate – while he still preferred to sit alone at the back of the class, he was now able to answer questions and complete small amounts of written work.



Over the coming weeks, Max began to make friends with the other students, join in with games and follow instructions from his peers and teachers. Allowing him to integrate at his own pace was crucial in helping him to feel safe and comfortable, and gradually he took his seat on the seating plan and started to join in properly with lessons.

Today, Max engages in all his lessons, takes pride in his work and is much more confident in verbalising his emotions. He arrives each morning keen to participate, and prefers reading a book or magazine to going litter-picking!

The Aurora Eccles School journey

When a young person arrives at Aurora Eccles School, we commit to exploring ways of helping them fulfil their potential in every area of their life.

We begin by rebuilding their faith in school and education, by creating an environment where they feel safe and able to learn. We take a positive approach to behaviour management, encouraging the development of a strong sense of identity while promoting effective interaction with others.

Individual pastoral support and care for each student is provided by their form teacher, who also has regular contact with their parents and carers to offer support, guidance and a link to other staff and departments. For students requiring higher levels of support, provision can be made – either full time or periodically – to facilitate participation in school activities.

Throughout their time with us, students have an opportunity to achieve a range of qualifications, from pre-entry-level certificates through to higher-grade GCSEs, depending on their needs, abilities and interests.

By the time they leave us, each of our students will be in a position to make meaningful, informed choices about their own future, whether that is by accessing further education, or through appropriate vocational training or employment.


