

Anti-Bullying Local Procedures Aurora Beeches School

Instances of bullying tend to have the following common characteristics:

- Repetitive and persistent. Bullying is usually experienced as part of a continuous pattern and it can be extremely threatening and intimidating even when very subtle. Nevertheless, sometimes a single incident can have precisely the same impact as persistent behaviour over time.
- **Intentionally harmful**. The act of bullying intends harm to another individual although occasionally the distress it causes is not consciously intended by all of those who are present.
- Involves an imbalance of power. Bullying leaves someone feeling helpless to prevent it or put a stop to it. In some case an imbalance of power may mean that bullying crosses the threshold into abuse requiring implementation of safeguarding procedures (refer to the school safeguarding procedures).

1) How to report bullying - children and young people

- Report to a staff member— such as your tutor, teaching assistant or the Head of School Adele Henson or any other teacher.

2) How staff report suspected bullying

- Any bullying incidents or potential bullying incidents should be logged on MyConcern.
- The site anti-bullying log should be checked in daily by the DSL Adele Henson. This log is kept in the DSL office.
- The DSL will take appropriate action and inform all parties of the proposed action and support plans.
-) If a bullying incident is reported then a bullying log is created by a member of the DSL Team and a MyConcern report is created.

3) Prejudice-based incidents

A prejudice-based incident is a one-off incident of unkind or hurtful behaviour that is motivated by a prejudice or negative attitudes, beliefs or views towards a protected characteristic or minority group. It

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can be targeted towards an individual or group of people and have a significant impact on those targeted. All prejudice-based incidents are taken seriously and recorded and monitored.

A prejudice-based incident is a one-off incident of unkind or hurtful behaviour that is motivated by a prejudice or negative attitudes, beliefs or views towards a protected characteristic or minority group. It can be targeted towards an individual or group of people and have a significant impact on those targeted. Prejudice based incidents are recorded on Engage and/or MyConcern. As for 'Bullying', all incidents will be monitored by the DSL and discussed in weekly HPG / Safeguarding meetings. All parties will be offered a debrief and attempts made for mediation. Individual support will be available for both parties. Depending on the level of the incident a referral may be made to the local safeguarding teams and/or Police.

4. Site initiatives to prevent and tackle bullying

We use a range of measures to prevent and tackle bullying including:

- The anti-bullying policy is disseminated to all pupils during tutor time, so they have an awareness, understand and uphold the anti-bullying policy.
- The PSHCE programme of study includes opportunities for pupils to understand about different types of bullying and what they can do to respond and prevent bullying.
- > Tutor time provides regular opportunities to discuss issues that may arise in class and for tutors to target specific interventions and staff contextualise daily.
- > Tutor time sessions help raise pupils' awareness of bullying and derogatory language.
- Difference and diversity are celebrated across the school through diverse displays, books and images. The whole school participates in events including Anti-bullying week, Black History Month, LGBTQ+ and other events such as Holocaust Memorial Day and other relevant events.
- The school values of equality and respect are embedded across the curriculum and as part of the reward system to ensure that it is as inclusive as possible.
- > Stereotypes are challenged by staff and pupils across the site.
- Restorative justice programmes provide support to those targeted by bullying and those who exhibit bullying behaviour.
- Pupils are involved in developing anti-bullying initiatives through consultation with the school council and through the Rights Respecting Schools award.
- Working with parents and carers, and in partnership with community organisations, to tackle bullying where appropriate.
- All incidents are discussed and actioned within weekly HPG/Safeguarding meetings.
